

Week 4: The Fight for Holiness

Opening

- Begin with a brief welcome and prayer to set the tone for the group time.
- Introduce the theme: We all carry desires for what we want in life from family goals to career dreams. But Paul reminds us in 1 Thessalonians 4:1–8 that the question isn't just "What do I want?" but "What does God want for me?" The answer may surprise us: God's will is our holiness. Holiness isn't about restriction, but about freedom living set apart for Him in a way that shapes our relationships, our families, and our witness as a family of families.

Discussion Questions CONNECT

- In the sermon, Clay addressed the topic of biblical manhood/womanhood. When you hear those words, what comes to mind? What does "man/womanhood" mean to you?
- Before hearing this sermon, how would you have answered the question: "What does God want for me?

DISCOVER

Read 1 Thessalonians 4:1-8 together as a group

- Paul says the Thessalonians are already pleasing God, yet he urges them to "do so more and more." What does this tell us about spiritual growth?
- Verse 3 says plainly: "This is the will of God, your sanctification." How is that different from the way people often talk about finding God's will?
- Why do you think Paul makes sexual holiness such a central part of God's will for His people?
- In verses 7–8, Paul connects holiness directly to God's call and the gift of the Holy Spirit. What encouragement or challenge does that bring?

APPLY

- In what areas of life do you feel it is hardest to live set apart for God? Why?
- How might holiness actually protect and free us, rather than restrict us?
- Paul warns against using others for our own desires (v. 6). What are some subtle ways this can happen in relationships, work, or even in church life?
- Think about your own manhood or womanhood. How is holiness meant to shape the way you love, serve, and honor others?

RESPOND

- God wants holiness for us but it's not something we drift into. What's one
 practical initiative you can take this week (strategy, discipline, accountability) to
 pursue holiness?
- How can our small group help each other grow in this together?

GROUP PRAYER

Take time for prayer requests and celebrations, and then spend time praying for these things specifically:

- Thanksgiving: Thank God for revealing His will to us through His Word.
- **Strength:** Ask for strength to resist temptation and for our hearts to treasure Christ over lesser desires.
- Holiness: Ask God to make us a family marked by purity, honor, and love.

CLOSING

God's will for us is clear: **our holiness.** Holiness is not about restriction, but about freedom — freedom to love God and serve people in a way that reflects Jesus. As we pursue holiness together, our families and our church family become a witness to the world of what life with God can look like.
